The attendance rule was strictly "miss three attendances and you were out!" The secretary would send out a warning after two missed attendances. The Club had 70 members and there was a waiting list. Many businesses encouraged staff to join Rotary.

Bailgate Rotary Club was set up in 1979. (Lindum Lincoln was set up in 1991 and Colonia, a Dual Gender Club was set up in 1997). The membership of ladies in the three original Clubs began in 1989 in Lincoln Club.

A special memory for Peter was when he presented a Paul Harris Fellowship to Len Curtis at his home as his wife Margaret was seriously ill and unable to travel.

Peter concluded by saying he enjoys being a Rotarian and has happy memories of trips to Scarborough and other venues for Rotary Conferences. He was particularly fond of the Carol Service when we were able to hold it in the Cathedral. Barry Dean, giving the vote of thanks agreed that being a Rotarian gives great enjoyment.
