President Dennis' Final Report

"AND NOW THE TIME HAS COME....

I started the year by saying that I wanted to increase the "involvement" of all members. I provided a series of monthly collections which I believed members could make, from their armchairs or on their phones, by involving family and friends and neighbours. It's not too much to ask a friend to contribute a tin of beans or an old phone. I sent a note to neighbours, and was rewarded with a number of contributions, including 80 tins of food for the Lincoln Larder (almost doubling the Club's own effort).

My first "public" engagement came hot on the heels of Handover, namely FFN's Canapes In





The Cloisters. Sadly, FFN doesn't yet have a venue for its 2025 event (the cloisters are undergoing refurbishment). For many years we have received a generous donation to our charity account.

I was very proud to represent the Club at the Remembrance Parade in Lincoln's High Street, and to lay a wreath. Both of my parents (now long dead) served in the armed forces during World War II so I find the event especially poignant.

Sadly, my Year as your President has been somewhat marred by the deaths of 3 of our long-serving and high-achieving members. Their contributions to the Club, in particular, and Rotary, in general, will not be forgotten. Their help and sage advice are sadly missed. As "Santa's Sleigh" is, now. our only active money raising event (and in the absence of anything new on the horizon) we really must consider expanding our efforts... I know that Patrick hopes that we will be collecting over 2 weekends in December. We do need (wo)manpower please. Obviously, some members simply can't "rattle a can" for 2 hours at a stretch, but perhaps they could offer an hour, or even just 15 minutes to let someone else have a coffee break. Every little helps!

That one (active) fund-raising event produced over £500 for UNICEF and the same for a more local charity (Umbrella) which was introduced to us by a member of the Club. How impressed we all were by the talk which 2 of its organisers later gave, which confirmed the value and the importance of our donation.

We were asked to carry out our usual "taxi" services for those attending Age UK's Christmas party on the first of our 2 Santa's Sleigh dates. It is a valuable experience to spend time with people who recognise the efforts made for them and who share stories about Lincoln's past (and their own) with their drivers. One such passenger told me how she had been a "very naughty girl" in her youth, but only with the man who had gone on to become her husband for some 65 years!

The big event of the Spring was the Disability Games. I had already volunteered to "look after" the Club's arrangements this year, taking over from Peter. I was helped, greatly, by Simon Kalson who took much of the burden off my shoulders. Having had the benefit of this year's experience I realized that some participants might need transport by car (rather than minibus) next year. I was accompanied, on the day, by David McKee and Malcolm (and Maggie) Miller, to whom I am very grateful. I may need to call upon help from more Rotarians next year so please put the date in your diary, now: 12 April 2026. You may not be required to go all the way to Ratcliffe College but may be asked to help transport participants from their homes to the shared pick-up point in Lincoln. May proved to be a busy month. Those stalwarts David and Malcolm joined me at District Assembly. We had a decent buffet lunch before wending our way home after doing our duty. I attended the sessions relating to recruitment. Sadly, some speakers just can't see that "more words" simply does not equate to "more members". Time was wasted.

We need to be active in recruitment. It is important to engage with friends and neighbours, as well as their children, and consider whether they might be interested in joining. We should then ask them directly. Rotary District does not have a magic wand and will not be providing us with the solution. Frankly, it is bereft of new ideas so come on... let us buck the trend... get new members in!!

The following week Alison and I attended a most enjoyable Charter Dinner with President Bob Alder and members of Lindum Colonia Rotary club. DG Chris entertained us with some stories of his life outside Rotary. The following evening (inadvertently) we took the members of Bailgate very much by surprise and attended their Charter celebrations. Our acceptances apparently had not reached the organiser! The ubiquitous David and Malcolm also attended (as did P E Patrick). A former member of our Club Eddie Strengiel gave a talk about his experiences as a councillor, and a great devotion to public service (worthy of a Rotarian!). The following afternoon I attended Peter Morrison's Malt Whisky Tasting, and what a delight it was. (I have already reported this in last month's newsletter, so I won't repeat that here, although I do repeat my thanks to Peter. A 3-figure sum was raised for charity). By the way, Peter has offered to hold a similar event next year... do look out for the date, I'm sure you would enjoy it.

Early in June I represented the Club at RAF Waddington's annual event for its "friends and neighbours". The Pipe Band was excellent, although the fly-past by a lone stealth spy plane was a little disappointing... unless, perhaps there were rather more planes that I didn't spot. Stealthy, eh?

Unfortunately, I was unable to attend Kid's Out at Sundown Park, and Malcom very kindly represented the Club. We provided a fabulous day out to 70 children with learning difficulties, from St Christopher's School (and carers). It is difficult, sometimes, for us to fully appreciate how much pleasure these children get from this (rare) day out. Malcolm reported that many of the children were wearing Rotary hats, which obviously they have jealously guarded over the years.

This year, for the first time, I was able to offer my help to the joint efforts of the 4 Lincoln clubs at the Lincolnshire Show. Whilst the service we offer seems very low-key it is of great value in reuniting some people with lost belongings, and this year we reunited one very distraught woman with her lost husband. (I wasn't convinced that he wanted to be found so soon!).

It is often said that an outgoing officer shouldn't thank specific individuals at the end of his term because, to do so might offend those whom he doesn't mention by name. However, it would be remiss of me not to remind you all of the sterling work done throughout the year, by David (not just in his role of secretary, although surely that is enough) and Malcolm (so often supported by Maggie) and Nigel and Lochan (always willing to help out when help is urgently needed). We have a new, vibrant Facebook page, thanks to Martin, who collaborates with John to produce a monthly bulletin. Barry has helped raise over £150 for our charities, the same prize in Dennis' Diddle is waiting to be won! Buy more tickets!

I am truly grateful to them and to all the members of the Club: who have offered me great support and friendship during the last 12 months, not least amongst them the stalwart Patrick, whose enthusiasm and commitment fills me with every confidence for the new Rotary Year, and I wish him well in that. I will try to support him next year, as he has supported me this. Now, I can no longer claim to be "the new boy", I feel very much at home with you all. Thank you." Dennis

On Monday last we were honoured by a visit from Simon Jones, the "new" Dean of Lincoln Cathedral. Simon told us how he had been born a polydactyl (no, I didn't know either) but was no longer !

After his ordination Simon had spent many years as chaplain at Merton College, Oxford. He had become aware of the mental strains that

undergraduates suffer and had developed a new pastoral team devoted to assisting in this arena. So far, the results have been very encouraging.

Simon had been "head-hunted" for his new position by a Bishop, but, ultimately his appointment had been confirmed to him by the Prime Minister, in accordance with convention.

Simon's task at Lincoln extends far beyond divine devotion into the more prosaic duties of maintaining an historic building (albeit one of the finest in Europe) costing £25,000 per day! With that duty in mind, the Dean plans to remind the people of Lincoln that the cathedral is their church, and to encourage them to use it more, not simply in devotional ways.

Simon fascinated us all with his talk, and Dick Denby proposed a vote of thanks on behalf of the Club.
